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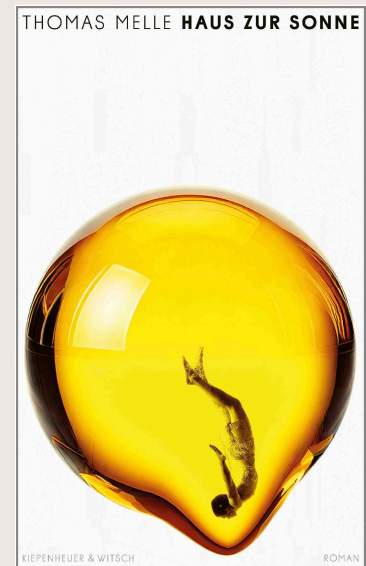

Thomas Melle, born in 1975, studied comparative literature and philosophy. He is the author of widely performed plays and has translated William T. Vollmann and Quentin Tarantino (among others) into German. His debut novel *Sickster* (2011) was nominated for the German Book Prize and received the Franz Hessel Prize for Contemporary Literature. He followed it up with the novels *3000 Euro* in 2014 and *Die Welt im Rücken* (*The World at My Back*) in 2016, both of which were shortlisted for the German Book Prize. *The World at My Back* has been **translated into 22 languages**. His latest novel *Das leichte Leben* (*The Easy Life*) was published in 2022.

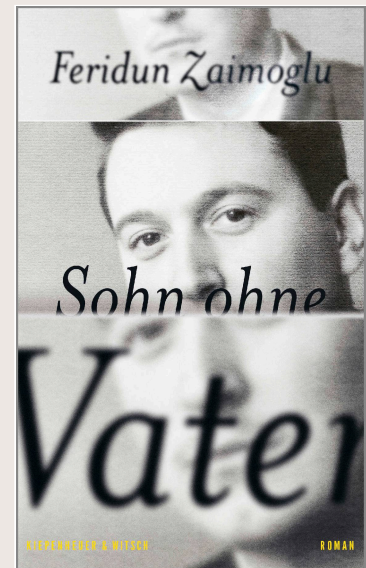

Here, people who are tired of life or terminally ill voluntarily enter this state-funded clinic to have every conceivable wish granted – before quietly departing from life. But do those who no longer want to live really want to die? Plumbing the depths of our longings and death drives, Thomas Melle offers a radical sketch of the human condition.

Feridun Zaimoglu, born in the Anatolian city of Bolu in 1964, has been living in Germany since he was six months old. He writes for *Die Welt*, *Frankfurter Rundschau*, *Die Zeit*, and *FAZ*. He has received numerous literary prizes. After *Leyla* and *Die Geschichte der Frau*, his most recent novel was *Bewältigung*. His books have been **translated into 14 languages**.

***Son Without A Father* is a stirring and haunting story about a grieving son, deceptive memories, and a road trip from Germany to Turkey**

It's early morning when his mother calls to tell him that his father has died. The narrator doesn't know what to do. He's alone in his grief. Who can help him, who can comfort him? He realizes that he must go to Turkey at once. He needs to see his mother, to support her – and to stand at his father's grave to say goodbye.

The narrator, a writer, is afraid of flying. So he asks two friends to take him in their camper van. Together, they plan their journey: via Linz, Szeged, and Edirne to Edremit and back. Over five thousand kilometers. It's the beginning of an adventure-filled, feverish road trip across Europe, marked by shimmering memories of his father and his many lives: as a husband, a laborer, a storyteller, and a septuagenarian whose dyed sideburns could stir up chaos across an entire holiday resort.

In his new novel, Feridun Zaimoglu explores how we remember those who are closest to us yet sometimes seem strangely alien to us, those who love and shape us, whom we care for and, despite everything, must eventually let go of.

Daniela Dröscher, born in 1977, lives in Berlin. She earned a doctorate in media studies on the poetics of the German-Japanese author Yoko Tawada, as well as a degree in “dramatic writing”. Among other accolades, she has received the Anna Seghers Prize, a work grant from the German Literature Fund, and the Robert Gernhardt Prize (2017). Her first book with Kiepenheuer & Witsch *Lies About My Mother* (2022) sold over 110,000 copies, was shortlisted for the German Book Prize (2022), the Favourite Book of Independent Booksellers (2022) and was **translated into several languages**. Everything is difficult before it gets easy. With intensity and wit, Daniela Dröscher tells the story of a woman who finally takes responsibility for her own happiness.

Ela has spent her whole life – quite literally – in her mother’s shadow. Her father blamed her mother’s overweight body for the family’s unhappiness. Now an adult, Ela is faced with her own ailing body, which fills her with despair. Just before completing her PhD, she suffers a breakdown. As she unconsciously struggles with the question of whether she truly deserves her place in academia, her body begins to revolt: her throat, her heart, her skin – everything is on fire. And Ela’s panic grows.

Much like her mother’s story – told in Dröscher’s hugely successful novel *Lies About My Mother* – Ela’s late-in-life journey of self-discovery and empowerment is masterfully rendered as autofiction: psychologically gripping and deeply moving.

In his supposed homeland of Formosa, George claims, the people are sun-worshipping cannibals who roam naked and communicate by singing. He says he was adopted by Jesuits there. Though his account contradicts everything previously reported by missionaries and travelers, everyone believes the fake Japanese man's tales. Even Samuel Johnson – England's own Goethe and a renowned salon wit – falls for the ruse and immediately takes George under his wing. George even makes it all the way to Oxford.

But what is life like when you constantly fear being exposed and attacked? Fortunately, there is Lucy, Johnson's daughter, who falls in love with George, even though she suspects that he is probably an impostor, but certainly a man with a dark secret...

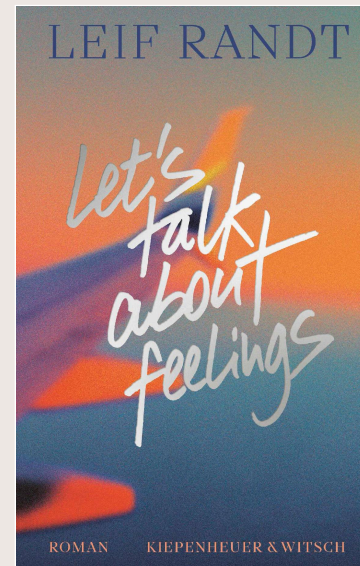

Leif Randt was born in Frankfurt in 1983. His books include the utopian *Planet Magnon* (2015), *Schimmernder Dunst über Coby County* (2011) and the international bestseller *Allegro Pastel* (2020) which was nominated for the German Book Prize and was awarded the Mörike Prize. *Allegro Pastel* was **translated into 12 languages**. Randt received numerous awards for his work, including the Erich Fried Prize and most recently the Hölderlin Prize as well as residencies in Japan and Ireland.

Leif Randt has written an optimistic novel about melancholy farewells. *Let's Talk About Feelings* is a celebration of fashion, desire, and the passage into middle age

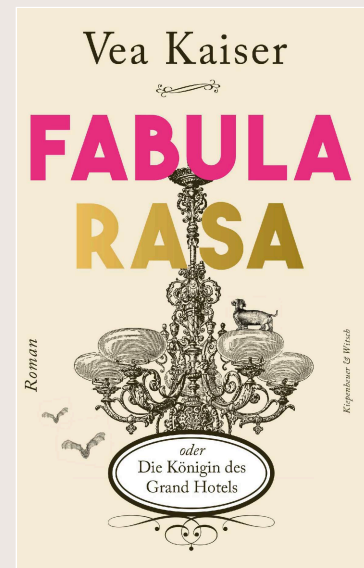

Vea Kaiser was born in 1988 and lives in Vienna. In 2012, she published her first novel *Blasmusikpop oder Wie die Wissenschaft in die Berge kam*, which reached the top of the ORF bestseller list and was named Best German-Language Debut at the international Festival du Premier Roman. *Makarionissi oder die Insel der Seligen* (2015) received the Ravensburger Verlag Foundation's "Best Family Novel" award. Kaiser's third novel, *Rückwärtswalzer oder die Manen der Familie Prischinger*, was published in 2019, and in 2024, she was awarded the international Jonathan Swift Prize for Satirical and Comic Literature. **Her books have been translated into several languages.**

Marius Goldhorn, born in Lahnstein in 1991, is the author of the novel *Park* (Suhrkamp Verlag) and the poetry collection *Yin* (Korbinian Verlag). His stories and essays have been translated into several languages. *Die Prozesse* is his first novel with Kiepenheuer & Witsch.

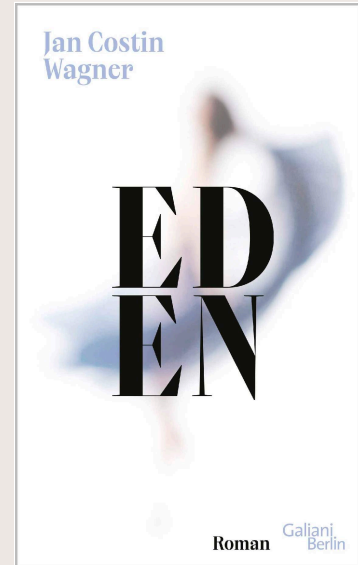

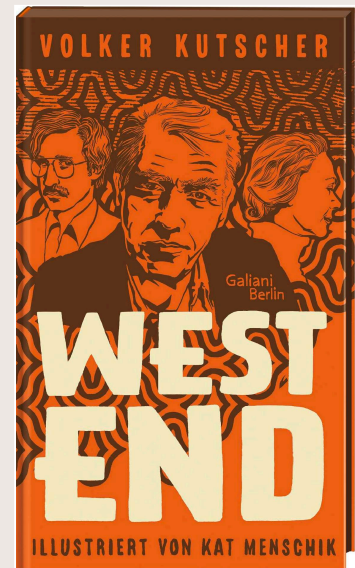

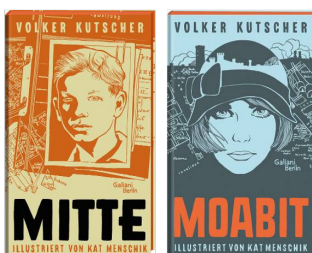
Kat Menschik is a freelance illustrator. Numerous books designed and adorned by her have won awards. *Westend* is a companion piece to *Moabit* (2017) and *Mitte* (2021) which are also set in the world of Gereon Rath.

Volker Kutscher writes of revenge, espionage, doom, lies, and illusions – and of how his heroes fared during the war and in the years that followed.

Berlin-Westend, 1973. A tape, an interview, a surprise: Private lecturer Hans Singer visits 74-year-old retired detective inspector Gereon Rath in a retirement home as part of his research into the Berlin police during the transition between political regimes. The historian is particularly interested in the police murders at Bülowplatz in 1931 – and the two men wanted by the police at the time, who both went on to have stellar careers within East Germany's state apparatus.

To Rath's discomfort, the conversation takes an unexpected turn. Singer knows all about his past: about his former colleagues, even his ex-wife. And he's digging into something Rath is determined not to talk about: events in East Berlin in 1953, with roots that reach back to the Bülowplatz murders more than twenty years before.

Peter Schneider, born in Lübeck in 1940, grew up in Freiburg, where he began his studies of German language and literature, history, and philosophy. He wrote short stories, novels, screenplays, and reports, as well as essays and speeches. His most important works include *Lenz* (1973), *The Wall Jumper* (1982), *Rebellion and Delusion* (2008), *My Mother's Loves* (2013), and *Club of the Steadfast* (2017). His most recent novel, *Vivaldi and His Daughters*, was published in 2019. Since 1985, Peter Schneider has taught as a visiting lecturer at American universities, including Stanford, Princeton, Harvard, and Georgetown University in Washington D.C.

Peter Schneider's new novel tells the story of a dramatic love triangle set against a backdrop of political awakening and aberration, love and betrayal, idealism and libertinism. A gripping book about German and personal guilt. About who we were back then – where we wanted to go and where we never arrived.

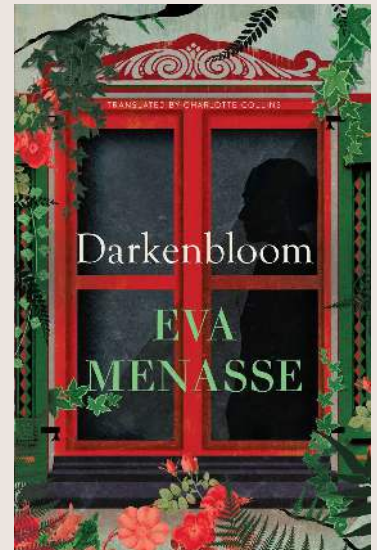
The Woman at the Bus Stop tells of two lovers who cannot live with each other, but also cannot leave each other. The story is complicated by the fact that it is told by a close friend of the couple, who has been in love with Isabel, "the most beautiful woman in the city," from the beginning. In his research into long-past events, he uncovers a kind of betrayal of his friend by Isabel, which he cannot get out of his head. Thus, in the mid-sixties, an odyssey of love, friendship, jealousy, and political unrest unfolds.

Schneider calmly looks back at these early years, when every heartache was the greatest, every happy experience final, and every betrayal the most unforgivable. What he finds is a time marked by humanity's most monstrous crimes and three representatives of a generation searching for rebellion, but above all for love and belonging.

Lutz Hachmeister (1959–2024) was media editor of the *Tagesspiegel* and director of the Grimme Institute as well as president of the International Film Festival Cologne and director of the Institute for Media and Communication Policy. He is the author of numerous films and books.

How do you interview a dictator? Lutz Hachmeister's first overall account of Hitler's encounters with journalists is an informative foil for dealing with the populists, autocrats and dictators of the present day.

Adolf Hitler gave an astonishing number of interviews in the course of his political career, several dozen, from the early 1920s to the 1940s. Anglo-American journalists in particular found the Austrian-born "Bavarian Mussolini" a fascinating interviewee. One may recognise in this a pattern that is common in dealing with radical figures in the media to this day - as for many journalists, these interviews promise career advancement, book deals, or prizes.

In his book, Lutz Hachmeister describes for the first time the overall history of Hitler's encounters with journalists, evaluates significant interviews with regard to their journalistic propagandistic strategy and also analyses the rivalries of Hitler's "media advisors". He considers these interviews in the historical context and in relation to Hitler's media strategy, and examines the complicity between propaganda strategists and reporters. The book is based on original sources and archive material, and provides a new and modern view on what was planned from the outset as a "propaganda dictatorship" - and its changing perceptions abroad.

Based on this, Hachmeister also draws a line to our present day: What dynamics are still apparent today between the media on the one hand and dictators or autocrats on the other?

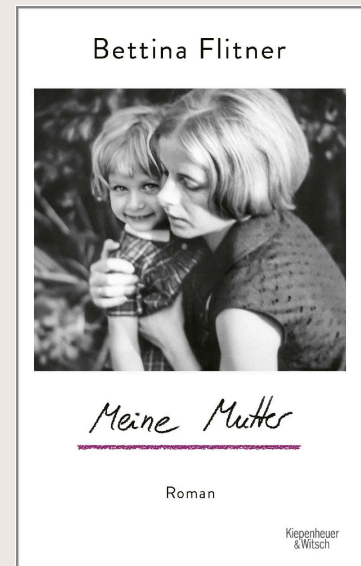

Can Dündar was born in 1961. This led to his being sentenced to over 27 years in prison for espionage and disclosure of state secrets. An assassination attempt was made on him in Turkey. He lives and works in exile in Berlin. 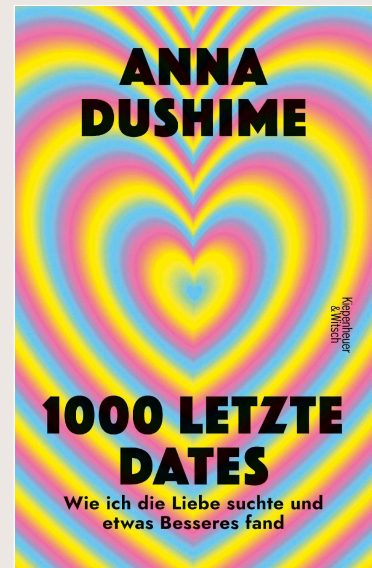

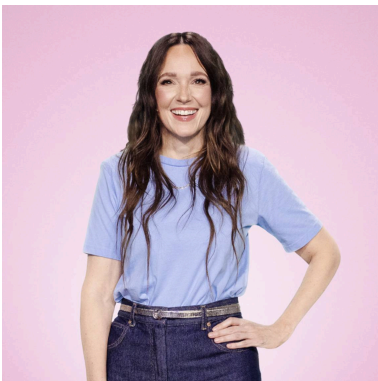

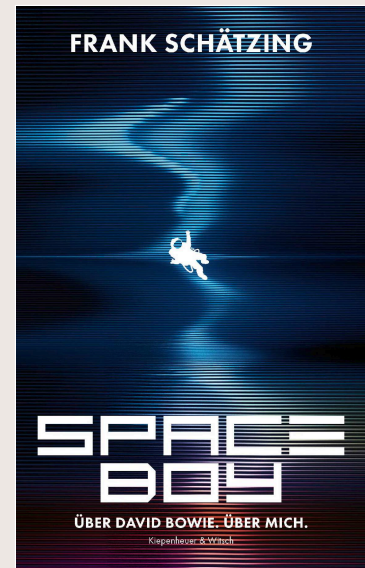

Frank Schätzing, born in 1957, published his debut *Death and the Devil* in 1995. His eco-thriller *The Swarm* was published in 2004 and went on to sell more than 4.5 million copies. It was translated into 27 languages. This was followed by the best-sellers *Limit* (2009), *Breaking News* (2014), *The Tyranny of the Butterfly* (2018) and *Heroes* (2024). He has also written two bestselling non-fiction titles: *Notes from an Unknown Universe* (2006) and *What If We Just Saved the World?* (2021). Frank Schätzing has received numerous awards for his works and they have sold 9 million copies altogether.

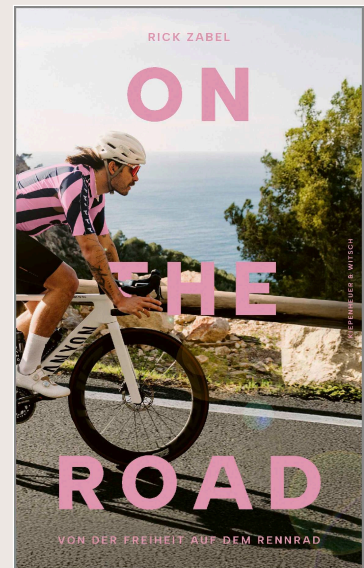

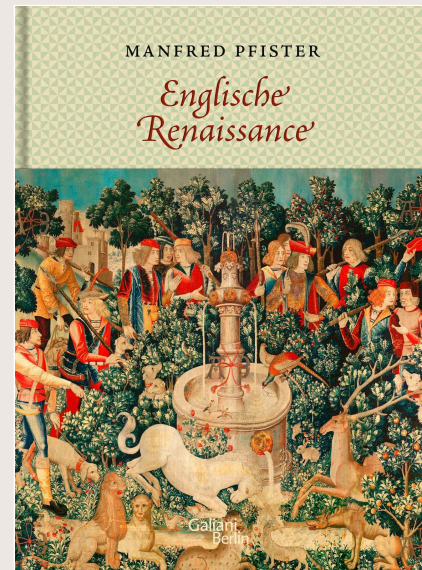

Manfred Pfister, professor of English language and literature and long-standing co-editor of the *Shakespeare Yearbook*, is regarded as one of the leading experts on the English Renaissance. At the same time, he has consistently aimed to build bridges to a broader readership. He has edited several anthologies and translated and annotated countless texts from English and American literature.

Hardly any other era so vividly reflects the rise of the modern European world – with all its highs and lows – as the English Renaissance. In just a short span of time, England transformed from a semi-barbaric island into the European engine of capitalism, art, and science.

Through more than 500 original texts – selected, introduced, and translated by Manfred Pfister – this volume opens up a tremendously varied panorama, spanning from Chaucer and Erasmus to Shakespeare and Milton.

Pfister presents portraits of queens who wrote poetry, rulers who believed in witchcraft, and state-sponsored pirates who brought tobacco to Europe. Theater legends like Ben Johnson and Shakespeare appear alongside brilliant poets, composers like John Dowland, inventors of the future like Thomas Moore (*Utopia*), and philosophers like Roger Bacon (*The Progress of Science*).

There are also depictions of more unusual figures: the biographer of melancholy Robert Burton, radical communists like the “Levellers,” the pioneering midwife Jane Sharp – who was the first to describe female anatomy without prejudice – and John Greene, who exposed card tricks and small-time crooks in London’s underworld.

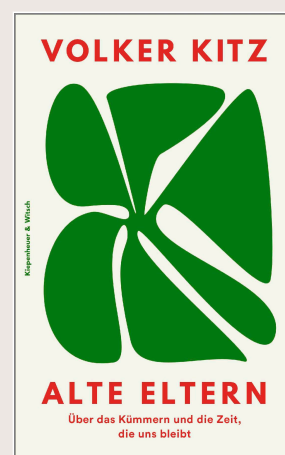

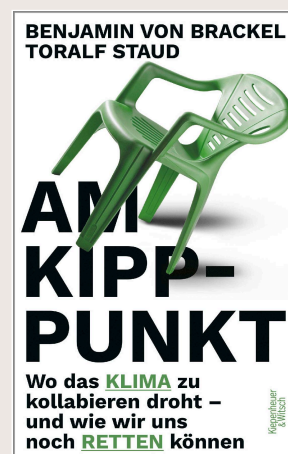
