

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

Marie Menke, born in 1997, studied politics and sociology in Bonn, Taipei, Cologne, and Paris. Her prose has been published in literary magazines and she received the OffSpring Award from lit.Cologne. *Killjoy* (*Spielverderberin*) is her literary debut.

Years after a traumatic event and a pact of silence shattered their friendship, a young woman is forced to confront her manipulative former best friend and her own guilt.

Sophie and Lotte are village girls and best friends since childhood but their dynamic shifts when Romy, a free-spirited girl from the city, joins them in high school. The trio is carried by mutual fascination, but also rivalry, jealousy, and even obsession. When Sophie and Romy move to the big city after school, leaving the vulnerable Lotte behind, their friendship faces a breaking point. Then Romy suddenly cuts all ties to them and old wounds reopen, forcing Sophie to confront the buried memory of a fatal night that changed everything.

Marie Menke writes powerfully about an obsessive friendship between village youth and big-city anonymity, and the force that binds three young women together while threatening to destroy them.



Maxim Leo was born in East Berlin in 1970. In 2011, he was awarded the European Book Prize for his autobiographical book *Red Love. The Story of an East German Family* (*Haltet Euer Herz Bereit*). His books *Where We Are at Home* (*Wo Wir zu Hause Sind*), *The Hero of Friedrichstrasse Station* (*Der Held vom Bahnhof Friedrichstrasse*) and *When We Were Young* (*Wir Werden Jung Sein*) became bestsellers and were **translated into several languages**. His novel *Frankie* (together with Jochen Gutsch) has been **translated into 24 languages**.

A hilariously funny and deeply moving novel about the search for the right life - and the masks we wear to survive the wrong one.

Ruthlessly efficient Marlene Buchholz is set to become the CEO of the Aviola Group. There is just one problem: while her numbers are perfect, her colleagues view her as a complete disaster on a personal level. 





Dana von Suffrin was born in 1985. She studied in Munich, Naples, and Jerusalem. She has received numerous awards, including the Klaus-Michael-Kühne Prize (2019), the Friedrich Hölderlin Promotion Prize (2020), the Chamisso Prize (2025) and her novel *Once More from the Top* (*Nochmal von vorne*) was longlisted for the German Book Prize in 2024.

***Toxibaby* is a relentless yet tender novel about a love that heals but also has the power to destroy, dissecting the relationship incapacity of an entire generation.**

The story follows "Sweetheart", a celebrated millennial writer craving love and acceptance, and "Toxibaby", a brilliant but paranoid and resentful alcoholic who blames late capitalism for his personal failures. The couple's relationship is a relentless cycle of ecstasy and despair, having survived thirteen breakups in under three years. While Sweetheart attempts to 'save' her partner she finds herself trapped in a bond defined by emotional abuse and unwavering devotion.


What begins as intoxicating love becomes a struggle for self-assertion, a game of dependence, and an intellectual showdown. Blending raw, vulnerable confession with dark humor and biting self-awareness, the novel explores the fine line between saving a relationship and destroying oneself.

Thomas Melle, born in 1975, is an author and translator. His debut novel *Sickster* was nominated for the German Book Prize and received the Franz Hessel Prize for Contemporary Literature. He followed it up with the novels *3000 Euro*, *The World at My Back* (*Die Welt im Rücken*) and *House in the Sun* (*House in the Sun*), all of which were shortlisted for the German Book Prize. His books have been **translated into more than 20 languages**.

How much self-determination is possible when mental illness controls your life? What does someone who feels they have nothing left to lose truly long for? And what might ultimate happiness look like?

Welcome to the “House in the Sun”, an institution that is both a wish-fulfillment machine and an abolition apparatus. Here, people who are tired of life or terminally ill voluntarily enter this state-funded clinic to have every conceivable wish granted – before quietly departing from life. But do those who no longer want to live really want to die?



A manic trip into literary obsession that hides a deep-seated family trauma

Vince is a literary scholar obsessed with the 18th-century author Laurence Sterne. He is drawn into a manipulative scheme when a mysterious man offers him the lost final book of Sterne's masterpiece. Vince's manic pursuit of the manuscript unearths his family's deepest traumas, blurring the lines between literary passion, reality, and a dark, elaborate fiction.

As the present crisis unfolds, the narrative weaves in flashbacks of Vince's mother whose sudden disappearance decades ago left a void the family tried to fill with linguistic games and various obsessions. Ultimately, Vince is forced to confront a reality that may be as constructed as the novels he adores.

Peggy Mädler, born in Dresden in 1976, is a dramatist and author. She is a co-founder of the artist group "Laboratory for Counterfactual Thinking", and was involved in the theater collective "She She Pop".

Peggy Mädler's novel follows the lives of a group of friends in East Germany, exploring the tension between political idealism and the retreat into private life.


In the mid-1960s, young economist Georg and his friends Roland and Marlies are captivated by the promise of cybernetics, hoping to use self-regulation to reform the socialist planned economy. However, the suppression of the Prague Spring in 1968 shatters these intellectual dreams, leading to Roland's dramatic escape across the Danube and leaving his friends traumatized. Georg retreats into the private sphere, building a bungalow in a weekend settlement in Brandenburg, while nearby, the artist Mona establishes an unconventional community in a dilapidated farmhouse.

Narrated through alternating perspectives and a collective village chorus, the story spans from these early days to 2023, following this motley group through the early days of the GDR to the end of socialism and the disillusionment with the unkept promises of freedom.

In his new novel, award-winning bestselling author Thomas Hettche explores the greatest of all emotions, telling the tender and passionate story of a late, unconditional love.



Martina Bogdahn takes us on a journey through an eventful summer, telling a humorous story of a life between routines, duties, and a sudden new perspective.

When the local priest of the quaint village Blumfeld dies unexpectedly, the orderly world of his housekeeper, Anna, is thrown into turmoil. She must organize his funeral and transport his ashes to the sea. To do this, Anna, in her early fifties, takes driving lessons from her former instructor and secret crush. 

Sebastian Hotz's second novel is a masterful play on the cultural conflicts of our time, telling a fast-paced story about generational shifts in show business.






In his new collection, poet Joachim Sartorius asks if the nights when a poem succeeds are truly the better nights, taking stock of his life through verse.

At the center of the volume are four poems addressing current wars, contrasting destruction with the enduring power of touch, warmth, and the sea. It is a book about what passes and what remains.

He received among others the Anna-Seghers-Preis (1988), the Hörspielpreis der Kriegsblinden (Radio Drama Prize of the War Blind, 1989), the Prix Chronos (2018) and the Günter Grass Prize (2019). Wolfgang Schorlau delivers a biting commentary on a political milieu that prioritizes power over the planet, centering on a politician whose career is threatened by his own mother.

In 2025 Berlin, the gas lobby pushes for Karsten Richter to become minister to avert climate neutrality measures. However, Richter's mother, a first-generation climate activist, decides to intervene, kidnapping herself to send a message about her son's lack of environmental conscience. A dramatic and absurd game of cat-and-mouse ensues in the corridors of power.

Daniel Schwartz, born in 1955, is a multi-award-winning Swiss photographer and author. In 1987-1988, he was the first foreigner to document the Great Wall of China in detail. Since 1980, he has published reports, essays, and long-term projects in exhibitions and books. He has been traveling to glaciers around the world for many years.

Daniel Schwartz has spent twenty years travelling the globe - from Uganda to the Swiss Jura - to document glaciers and the fascinating stories locked within their ice.

In the Ruwenzori Mountains in Uganda, Schwartz thinks of the Greek geographer Ptolemy, who wondered in ancient times whether the source of the Nile lay there. On Nanga Parbat, he finds the remains of the failed Nazi expeditions of the 1930s in the thawing ice. At the southern foot of the Swiss Jura, he not only traces the millennia-long journey of erratic boulders, but also accompanies his nearly 90-year-old father on his last hike to one of them. He photographs the Birch Glacier from a helicopter at the last possible moment – the next day, it crashes into the valley and buries the village of Blatten.

He combines these personal experiences with literary sources from antiquity to the present day and showcases glaciers in all their diversity: as a dwindling archive of climate history, an archaeological site and an intangible repository of memories.
