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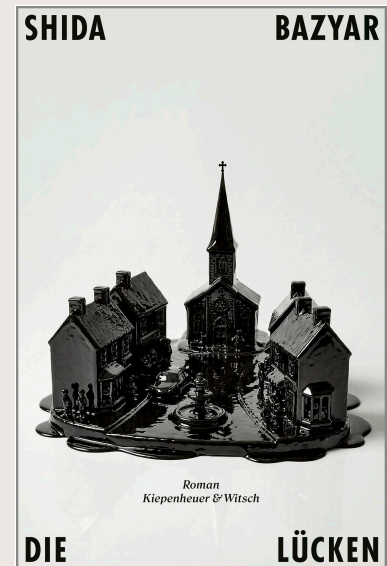

Heimesbach in the Hunsrück is a fictional place where ninety years of German history have become embedded in its walls and biographies. It is a community that actively conceals its past whilst simultaneously becoming a refuge for those seeking safety here. Moving fluidly across generations, the narrative spans from the 1930s rise of local Nazi groups who systematically destroyed Jewish families, to wartime profit-seekers who rebranded themselves as innocent bystanders after the war. Decades later, the Karimpour family flees the revolution in Iran to seek refuge in this quiet village, completely unaware that their new home rests upon unatoned historical crimes. Shida Bazyar crafts a masterful narrative mosaic about the burden of history, the lie of a new beginning, and the desire to finally find a home.

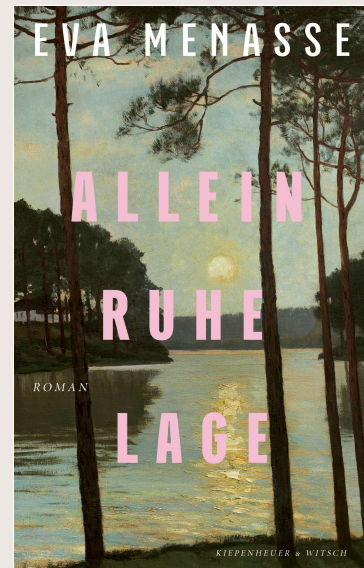

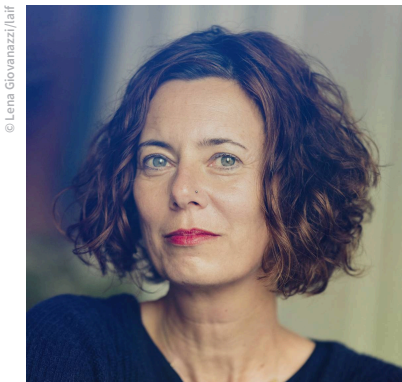

Eva Menasse was born in Vienna in 1970 and has lived in Berlin for over twenty-five years. She has published several bestselling novels and short story collections, as well as essay collections. Her accolades include the Heinrich Böll Prize, the Friedrich Hölderlin Prize, the Jonathan Swift Prize, the Austrian Book Prize, the Ludwig Börne Prize, and a fellowship at the Villa Massimo in Rome. **Her books have sold over 500,000 copies and were translated into 14 languages.**

A woman decides to sell her weekend cottage: originally meant as a family summer home, it became a place of solitary retreat after her divorce. Now it is time to turn a page and to take a last look at everything that transpired within its walls.

Seclusion is an exploration of being right and being wrong; of searching, arriving, and eventually moving on. It balances the tension between leisure and labor, the rhythms of gardening and nature, and the shifting tides of love, family, and parenthood. Menasse examines what time does to us and how our inner landscapes evolve. Ultimately, it is a novel about happiness, that elusive state we often "only recognize as it is passing."

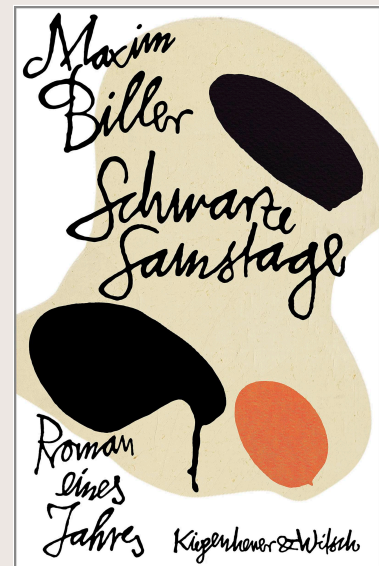

Maxim Biller, born in Prague in 1960, has lived in Germany since 1970. His books include his memoir *Der Gebrauchte Jude* (*The Second-Hand Jew*) (2009) and the novella *Im Kopf von Bruno Schulz* (*Inside the Head of Bruno Schulz*) (2013). His bestseller *Sechs Koffer* (*Six Suitcases*) was shortlisted for the German Book Prize 2018. Most recently, he published the novel *Mama Odessa* (2023). His books have been **translated into numerous languages.**

Ari, the novel’s first-person narrator, believed the worst was behind him. After fleeing communist Czechoslovakia in the 1970s, his family found a home in Hamburg’s legendary Grindelviertel. Yet, upon his arrival, the neighborhood’s once-flourishing Jewish life had been replaced by left-wing students dreaming of Israel’s end. By the ‘golden decade of pop’ in Munich in the 80s, the specter of old antisemitism seemed to vanish. Ari never imagined its return - not until October 2023, when Hamas terrorists, fueled by exterminatory rage, attacked Southern Israel. Since that day, Ari asks himself where this eternal desire for the annihilation of the Jews originates. This thoughtful, gripping, and deeply poetic novel offers the attempt of an answer.

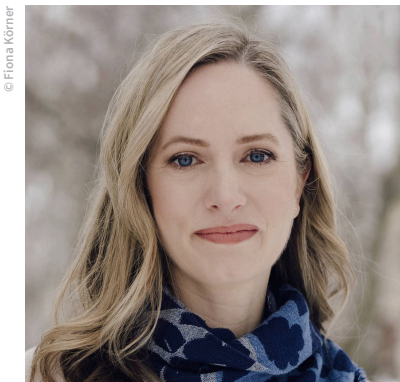

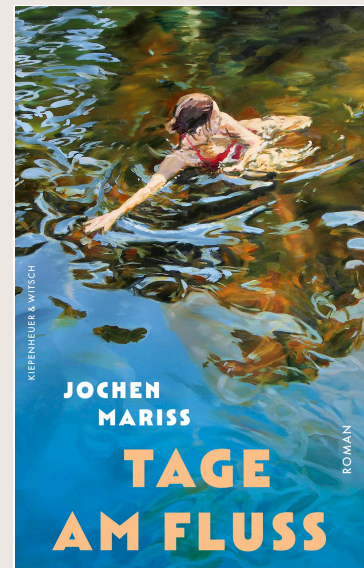

Jochen Mariss, born in 1955, is a freelance writer. *Tage am Fluss (Days by the River)* is his debut novel. He has previously published short stories and children's books.

On a hot summer's day, a young man ends up at the ferrywoman Sara Harmsen's house and begins to chip away at all the walls she has so carefully built.

Sara is in her late forties, living an intentionally isolated life on a small farm along a crescent-shaped bend of a river known as the "Green Moon". She spends her days keeping a small flock of chickens and operating the local ferry link that connects the rural area to the outside world. Her only friend is her dog Luna.

Her carefully guarded solitude is upended when Leon, a young climate activist, collapses on her ferry after fleeing a violent police dispersal of a nearby forest occupation. Sara begrudgingly takes in the young man in exchange for manual labor. As they work together shearing sheep and repairing roofs, they begin to form a delicate bond that allows them to open up and face their old wounds. When the two of them oppose a planned bridge that threatens Sara's ferry, they find themselves facing hostility and attacks from the village. And then the river bursts its banks too ...

Alexandra-Maria Pipos, born in Romania in 1989 and raised in Germany, studied International Relations and Communication & Cultural Management. In 2021, she won the writing competition organised by the Literaturhaus Zürich, and in 2023 she was a finalist in the 31st open mike. *Gib mir alles* (*Give Me Everything*) is her first novel.

Ioana works herself to the bone: at her job and in her constant efforts to meet the expectations of her Romanian family. When her grandfather dies, she reaches her limits – and is forced to reinvent herself.

Both in her job at Cadrus Consulting and as a self-sacrificing daughter, Ioana believes in hard work. She ignores the fact that the lines between self-improvement and obsession are blurred. The upcoming pitch, which is set to secure her the long-awaited promotion, is simply too important. Then she is unexpectedly called to Romania for her grandfather's funeral. Once there, with one ear still on client calls and the other already tuning into her Uncle Radu's jokes, she is confronted with her family's history – at times madcap and endearing, at others abysmal – and a country she no longer recognises. Soon she begins to doubt the memories of her childhood summers and her parents' stories. In the end, she must ask herself what's left when you no longer have to impress anyone.

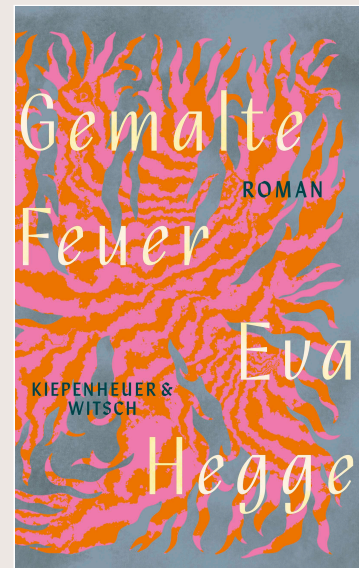

Struggling with her unfulfilled desire to have a child, a young woman finds herself in a liminal world, trying to find a way to break free from convention and norm.

Rebekka is in her mid-thirties, has a degree but works as a sales assistant in a furniture shop. She is in a relationship, longs for a child who does not come, and wonders why this desire is so strong and why it cannot simply disappear. When Rebekka's best friend Jenny becomes pregnant before her, a noose tightens around Rebekka's heart. And she is overcome by the feeling that everything in her life is now falling into a fateful order. It is December 1980, just one day before Christmas Eve, and West Berlin is buried in snow. Frankie Lehmann has spent weeks trying to get in with the squatter scene of Kreuzberg, while his older artist brother, Freddie, plans his escape to New York City. To fund his ticket, Freddie checks into a specialized clinic on the Kurfürstendamm to act as a paid guinea pig for experimental antidepressants. The trial leaves him with a severe phobia of crowds and public transit, causing him to lose an invaluable travel bag containing his life savings. Embarking on a frantic twenty-four-hour journey across a divided city, the brothers navigate broken-down cars, bizarre subcultures, and sudden romances in a poetic celebration of survival and fraternal loyalty.

Alain Claude Sulzer was born in 1953. His books have been translated into all the major languages. He has received numerous awards for his work, including the Prix Médicis Étranger, the Hermann Hesse Prize and the City of Basel Culture Award.

Diverse characters gather for the memorial of a once-shining director, each bringing their own grievances, hopes, and secrets.

They are all traveling to the capital for the grand memorial service of Simon Muthesius, a once-glorious theater director and legendary artistic director whose public fame had faded long before his sudden death. Hanns Zischler, born in 1947, is a celebrated author, fine art photographer, and actor who has worked with directors like Wim Wenders and Steven Spielberg. His historical research work, *Kafka geht ins Kino* (*Kafka Goes to the Movies*) (2017), was **translated into many languages**. In 2026 Zischler starred as Thomas Mann in the film *Vaterland* (*Fatherland*), which premiered at the Cannes Film Festival, alongside Sandra Hüller.

After the death of her mother in Japan, Hanaka discovers a bundle of letters that reveal a secret, decades-long relationship with a Berlin painter.

Hanaka, a German-Japanese archivist living in France, receives news that her estranged mother, Johanna, has passed away in Kobe, Japan. Hanaka travels across the world to close down her mother's high-end fashion studio. Tucked away inside the silk lining of an unfinished linen jacket, she uncovers a bundle of airmail correspondence spanning over twenty years. The letters were sent from a single source: an eccentric painter named Kusmín based in West Berlin during the Cold War. Realizing her mother lived a secret parallel life of profound romantic passion, Hanaka travels to Berlin to track down the painter, assembling a beautiful new picture of her family's past.

Reinhold Neven Du Mont was born in Cologne in 1936. From 1969 to 2001, he was the owner and publisher of Kiepenheuer & Witsch. To date, he has published three novels (*Die Villa*, 2009, *Der Maskensammler*, 2011, *Alexandra Minderop*, 2023), his autobiography *With Books and Authors – My Life as a Publisher* (2016) and several volumes of short stories.

September 1854: The freighter Indus sets sail from Southampton, bound for Bombay. On board are three brothers from Bavaria: Hermann, Adolph and Robert Schlagintweit. The three geologists and experienced mountaineers begin an expedition that will ultimately lead to a life-and-death struggle.

Paula Fürstenberg is furious. Like all children of the post-reunification era, she was promised flourishing landscapes and anti-fascism in the euphoria of reunification. The reality was different: unemployment, depopulation and right-wing violence. And today: a far-right party all too happy to embrace the patriotic and nationalist idea of internal unity.

On 3 October 1990, amidst all the black, red and gold, numerous Reich flags can also be seen. And whilst people shed tears of joy at the Brandenburg Gate, over a thousand neo-Nazis are rampaging through the newly united country. Fürstenberg fills in the gaps in our narrative of German reunification, which is still celebrated today as a defining moment for democracy – but which can also be seen as the birth of a new nationalism.

In her incisive, sometimes boisterous, sometimes tender interjections, she comes to the conclusion: we don't need to grow together into a single unified people. It is far more important to do justice to Germany's diversity.

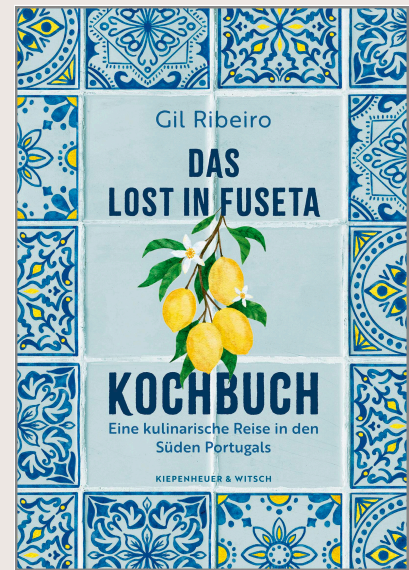

Rolf G. Heinze is a professor and the Managing Scientific Director of the Institute for Housing, Urban and Regional Development (InWIS) at Ruhr University Bochum.

Sebastian Kurtenbach is a professor of political science at Münster University of Applied Sciences. One of his main areas of research is urban development and neighbourhoods. His highly acclaimed book *Kinder – Minderheit ohne Schutz* (*Children. A Minority Without Protection*) was nominated for the German Non-Fiction Prize in 2025.

Monchi is the singer and lyricist of one of the most successful German punk bands, *Feine Sahne Fischfilet*, with whom he went from youth centers in 2007 to the main stage at Rock am Ring. With the band, he is committed to fighting rightwing extremism. The award-winning documentary *Wildes Herz (Wild Heart)* about the band's social and political commitment came out in 2017.

After living for years in the progressive hub of Rostock, the iconic punk rock singer Monchi returns to his tiny birthplace of Jarmen in Eastern Germany. 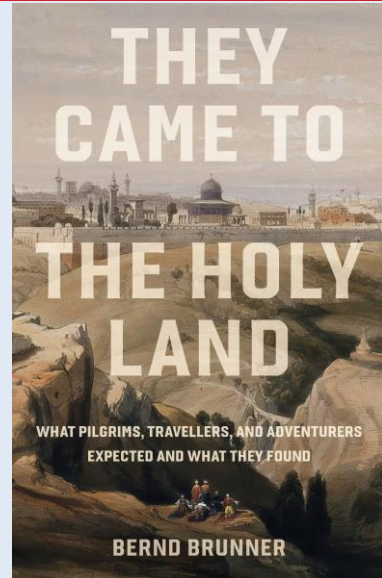

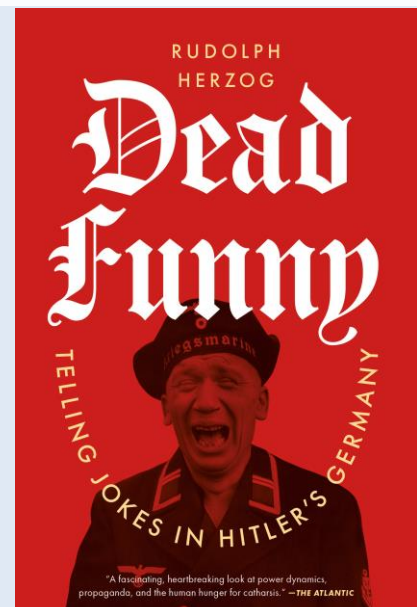
